RIBBON CUTTING

The first section of trail built specifically as Burke River Trail opened in August. The new 0.6 mile trail is on Burke County Public Schools property and the trail easement is held by Town of Valdese.

Valdese Mayor Pro Tem Gary Ogle welcomed the crowd of forty hikers, volunteers, elected officials and municipal staff. Dr. Karen Auton, BCPS Deputy Superintendent, shared the school system was pleased to be a part of this effort and that it would be a benefit to the students.

TRAIL TIMELINE

Getting trail on the ground can take years, even with willing landowners

- June 2020 Initial Meeting held with all Stakeholders
- **January-March 2022** Specific Meetings and Presentations with Burke County, School Board & Town of Valdese
- September 2022 Permission to design, build and survey trail
- March 2023 Survey complete and start on final easement language
- June 2024 Easement agreement filed
- August 2024 Trail open to public

Wildcat Way was one of the first targeted sections of Burke River Trail during initial discussion back in 2020 when work started in earnest on Rep Blackwell's vision for a trail along the river. As Beth Heile was exploring potential routes for the trail, she reached out to the developer on the east side of DHS and upon sharing the vision, Larry Bragg saw the benefit of having the trail in his development. At that time, the "Valdese Greenway" was still grass and there was no McGalliard Creek Bridge. When completed, McGalliard Falls to the eastern side of the development will be about a 4 mile section.

GATHERING TOGETHER

BRTA started working with the Town of Glen Alpine Aldermen in January 2024 in starting a grant application for a downtown gathering space. Some aldermen expressed a desire for a volunteer organization that would focus on the town.

After the April 11 Park Public Input Meeting, BRTA lead a organizational meeting of Glen Alpine volunteers. After some discussion, attendees decided they wanted to do more to bring people downtown. BRTA continued to meet with the group for several weeks and handle d finances. On June 1, around 125 people took part in the Glen Alpine in the Street Committee's first event - Pickin' in the Streets.

CIVIC ENGAGEMENT & DOWNTOWN BOOST

DOWNTOWN GATHERING SPACE

Located at the intersection of Bridge Street and Linville Street, the new gathering space will spur downtown revitalization with an event lawn for festivals, a picnic shelter, and restroom. The 1.3 acre site is town owned property and is the western terminus of the Burke River Trail. Surveying was completed in December and the grading plan is being developed. The plan shown is being adapted in phases. Concerts and festivals can take place on the lawn without having to close Linville St.

TAKE OUT THE TRASH!

BRTA first caught the "litter bug" during, the Burke County Chamber of Commerce Litter Sweep in March. We committed to holding a trash pickup in each our our Trail Towns. That's nine times events in one week. Once we completed that week, BRTA decided to host a Trail Town Trash Pickup everyone month. **The events cover two of our focus areas -**

- **Community Engagement** Bringing together volunteers who care enough to work to make their area more inviting
- **Conservation** Trash left on the side of the road or along the water line, can leach harmful chemicals into the soil and waterways and endangers wildlife through ingestion, entanglement and cuts.



Royal Park will be the eastern terminus of Burke River Trail.

Located in downtown Hildebran, Royal Park will include a covered stage, splash pad, 1/4 mile walking track, new concession building with restrooms, and inclusive play equipment.

REP HUGH BLACKWELL trail visionary

In late 2018, Rep Blackwell talked to Beth Heile during a Valdese Rotary Pancake Breakfast regarding his idea for a trail along the river. The goal of trail was to bring economic development opportunities and health for Burke towns and residents.

An earnest effort started on the "trail along the river" in January, 2020.

Rep Blackwell and Heile met with Scott Carpenter and Shane Prisby of the Burke County Community Development Department. The county did not have time to work on this new trail. However, Prisby did put together some ideas of how where the trail could run as proof of concept.

From there, Heile started contacting large land owners about the possibility of hosting trail and the positive response from Natural Land Alliance started a huge wave. The foundation was laid for a 4-mile section with Town of Valdese, Burke County Public Schools, and the developer.

For the rest of 2020, Rep Blackwell and Heile traveled to all Burke County's local governments and large landowners to gather support for the trail. From that support, progress continues.

HOUSING

Contacting large landowners to discuss trail on their property is a first step in developing a long-distance trail. During outreach, BRTA has been fortunate to encounter several owners who understand the benefits of allowing public trail on their land. Trail is an attractive, desired amenity a developer can offer to homeowners.

The recent housing study commissioned by Burke County shows the county has an overall housing gap of almost 5,000 units for rental and for-sale at all price points. With development opportunities being uncovered while exploring the trail corridor, Beth Heile and Rep Blackwell organized a "housing opportunity tour" for Burke County Manager Brian Epley. The goal was to visit municipal managers and developers on site to learn more about the available options and the obstacles from those working directly on housing and mixed-use projects.

Burke River Trail is a path to housing.

LONG VIEW TO HILDEBRAN

In February 2023, the NCDOT Integrated Mobility Division announced a \$62,825 Feasibility Study grant to find the best pedestrian route between the towns. With the study complete, the towns will be in a better position to apply for grant funding for a sidepath or sidewalk.

BRT is about safe transportation. In this area, walking and biking paths will be very beneficial to connecting residents to jobs, shopping and classes. Long View will be a connection to the App State Hickory Campus and Catawba Valley Community College's Workforce Innovation Center.



Open Hearts Place is working on housing on Tenth Street which is along the route designated by the feasibility study. Thanks to BRT, efforts, these 40 homes will have safe transportation to daily needs.




GREAT TRAILS




